Dear First Family!

September is approaching quickly and it is one of my favorite months of the year! It is a sign that the season is changing. For me, September brings forth this sense of anticipation within me. From a liturgical perspective, there is anticipation within me as we move through the scriptures post Pentecost and make our way to Advent in late November. Personally, September has represented a time of preparation for me. A time to help my family prepare for their new routines of school and work. A time to prepare the church for an exciting journey of self reflection, spiritual growth and discipleship.

On a personal note, I have been struggling this month with concerning health issues. A couple of nights I had to go to the ER again as I thought I was having a heart attack. Come to find out I now know what has been contributing to all of my scary symptoms.... GERD! For those who do not know what GERD is, it is more advanced than heart burn.

It is a chronic disease that occurs when stomach acid or bile flows into the food pipe and irritates the lining. Acid reflux and heartburn more than twice a week may indicate GERD.

The way GERD has manifested in my case, it started to create the scary chest tightness. My potassium was depleted as I was not able to take in nutrients because every time I ate, I got full instantly. It began to cause the dizzy/fainting spells and difficulty in swallowing, hence why I began avoiding foods altogether. It creates shortness of breath, elevated heart rate and blood pressure; all which I have been struggling with these past two weeks; if it goes unchecked. One of my other numbers that indicated a possible blood clot was forming, but was proven to be benign, was something that almost made me faint upon hearing alone. The bottom line folks, our bodies are a miracle in that it gives us signs when things are not ok. I am so glad that mine

gave me enough symptoms so that I could be made aware and do something before it escalated to ulcers, cancer and more!

So I am sharing this as a witness to all that what I learned most importantly is that our gut health must be priority, or it can start to affect other major organs in our body.

Today starts the journey to healthier eating and wholeness. I do not want to have stomach problems like my dad did which contributed to his pancreatic cancer. I can be stubborn but on this particular subject, I will take heed and begin my GERD diet and take my prescribed meds. So thanks for your prayers and thoughts. No weapon, no GERD, no condition will stop this woman from doing her purpose. I thank God for watching over me! Most importantly I appreciate your prayers and thoughts during this time. My new meds are making me stronger by the day. I look forward to getting back to the pulpit and going forth with ministry.

shortage. Your love, compassion, and generosity is making a difference everyday.

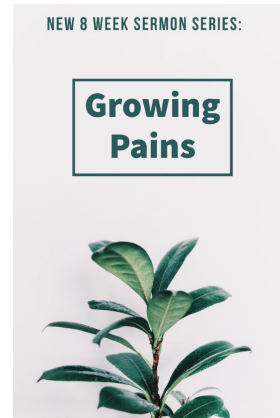

Lesson on Forgiveness
Are you looking for ways to connect with your children and continue to have faith moments at home? Here is a lesson to teach kids about the power of forgiveness, like when we forgive others and when God forgives us.

Items needed: A Bible, Silly Putty, newspaper or other images that will transfer onto putty

Fun Fact: Silly Putty was discovered during World War II by researchers trying to make artificial rubber. It was first marketed to the public in 1950. You can make your own putty by mixing 1/2 cup white glue with 1/4 cup corn starch. For best results, add the liquid starch 1 tablespoon at a time, mixing thoroughly before adding more starch.

Open your Bible and read Jeremiah 31: 34b and Ephesians 4:32. These verses remind us that when God gives us forgiveness, he no longer remembers the wrong things we've done. God asks us to forgive others just as he forgives us.

Give your child a piece of Silly Putty clay, and demonstrate how to transfer a picture by pressing the Silly Putty over the paper. Show your children how they can stretch the putty to create different effects. Then have them squeeze the Silly Putty into a ball to erase the picture. Give kids a few minutes to transfer and erase several pictures.

Suppose you transferred a picture and never erased it. How

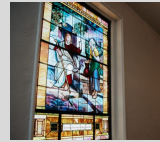

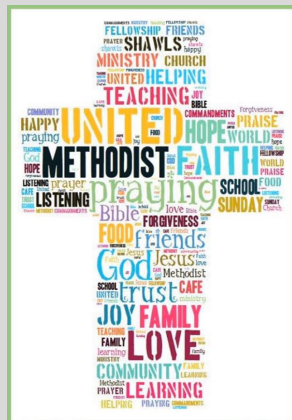

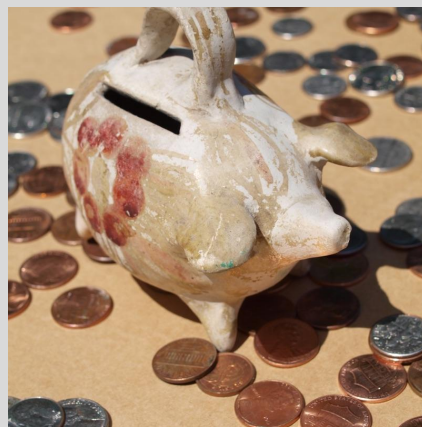
