Scriptural Lesson: 1 Samuel 3: 1-10 Sermon Series: Awakening Part 1

We are continuing with our Awakening series; a series where week to week, the preaching goal is to identify moments of scripture that might invite us to consider a different or fresh perspective of something that we might have never considered before;

- For this Church is the essence of what a true spiritual awakening is;
- It is that moment where you and I gain clarity;
- It is that moment where the Word of God strikes the fertile ground of our soul;
- It is that moment where something connects within us so deeply, that as a result we are truly transformed;

- And although sometimes our awakening moments within this series or beyond, may evoke some troublesome discoveries within us;
- For the awakenings and connections that many of us are finding within scripture; that are parallel to the global crisis of racism, poverty, corruption and more are quite unsettling;
- I stopped by to suggest that although these types of new awakenings are shattering to the souls that are only eager to sow seeds of God's love and nothing more;
- I would encourage you and I not to shy away from these discoveries that this horrific storm of senseless violence reveals;
- For the hope is that now that our eyes are open;
- Now that our ears our open;
- Now that our hearts are open;
- The hope is that perhaps the Holy Spirit can use this new found awareness, as a teaching moment; for

- how you and I might continue the great work of leaders such as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., John Lewis, Ruth Bader Ginsburg and more;
- Leaders that have sacrificed so much; so that all of us can truly pursue the happiness that the Declaration of Independence proclaims that all humans have been given by their creator;
- So that you and I can continue this work until we have satisfied this proclamation that I have just stated;
- For the harrowing discovery that I believe many of us cannot unsee or disclaim anymore; is that all humans truly are not in the same position to pursue this happiness that the articles of this constitution declares;
- And before I receive potential pushback on this sentiment that I have shared;
- For some might suggest that one does not need money or things to be happy;

- Some might suggest that one does not need nice things to be happy;
- I will share with you that I agree with you on this;
- For it is not lack of monetary resources that I am suggesting is what makes a person unhappy;
- But on the contrary; it is the constant
 dehumanization and marginalization that makes
 people unhappy;
- It is the lack of consideration for the sacredness of human life that makes people unhappy;
- It is the constant abuse of one's privilege that makes people unhappy;
- It is the constant gaslighting that seems to occur for those who are on the oppressed side of history; (gaslighting is defined as manipulate (someone) by psychological means into questioning their own sanity.); that makes people unhappy;
- It is the feeling of being unseen that makes people unhappy;

- Or at least I can say that things like this makes me unhappy;
- And so these are some of the thoughts that I am bringing to this text of 1 Samuel on this Martin Luther King Jr. weekend celebration;
- For I am drawn to this story of Samuel and Eli for many reasons;
- Part of my curiosity and appeal towards this text is witnessing a young person such as Samuel; step up and answer his call at such a young age;
- For scripture does not indicate how old Samuel actually is at this time in our text;
- What we do know in our scripture for today is that
 Samuel had reached an important period of his life.
- Samuel is described as a child, but that is no definitive indication of his age.

- The original word may refer to one of any age between an infant and an adult of forty years;
- Some scholars would suggest that Samuel's chronological age is 12 at this time;
- Either way, I believe that there is tremendous significance in this passage identifying that Samuel is young;
- For The word of Jehovah was precious in those days; there was no frequent vision (v. 1).
- So the fact that the Word of the Lord and the vision which Samuel witnessed, as recorded in this chapter, were so infrequent during this period in Israel;
- the true awakening of this text from my vantage point, is that the Word and call came to Samuel; thereby making him immediately recognized as a prophet.
- And why is that such a big deal one may ask?

- Well for starters; you and I often hear this sentiment expressed in church time and time again; that the youth are our future;
- This is why from a leadership perspective; **I am**intentional about empowering young people in every
 aspect of the Church; to be their best selves; as they
 discover what it means to share your time, talents,
 gifts, service and witness to the world and to the
 community of Church;
- I am intentional about making spaces in worship;
 (not just on Youth Sunday); but every Sunday;
- From playing the organ, to playing the cello; from reading scripture to leading a small group and possibly more;
- I am intentional about making spaces in leadership for young people;

- Thereby giving youth and young adults a healthy amount of training, encouragement and time; so that they can fulfill the mission of taking on the metaphorical helm of this boat; the church;
- With the confidence and assurance in God; that they will be able to weather any storm that they may come up against;
- The other appeal of this text for me is centered around the words of Samuel, "Here I am."
- In light of all that is going on in the world, I am hoping to explore in this message or at least start the conversation on this idea of what does it mean when you and I say "here I am."
- How are you and I called to be here in the midst of a world that has been literally divided into two for a myriad of reasons?
- How are you and I called to be here in the midst of a world that is fighting a serious epidemic of sickness,

racial violence and division, food insecurity, poverty without relief and more?

- What do we mean when we say here I am?
- Are we talking about being present in attendance only?
- Are we professing to be here as a silent witness?
- Are we proclaiming to be here as an active participant?
- What does being here involve?
- Is it enough?
- Do we need to do more?
- What if we don't know how to do more?
- What if we don't know how to be here?
- Church, I don't have any preconceived judgments or expectations or even answers to any of these tough questions that I have asked.

- These are questions that I am inviting us to think about and even wrestle with as it pertains to who we are and why we are here?
- Because I do believe that if we spend some significant time on these tough questions; then part of the solution will begin to reveal itself to how you and I might conquer these horrific metaphorical storms of racial injustice, social injustice; violence and more;
- Storms dare I suggest that we all are in the dead center of;
- How do you and I live out this concept of being here?
- What do we mean when we say "Here I am?"
- So perhaps how you and I might begin to address this statement of what it means when you or I say "here I am", is by discovering perhaps what Samuel meant when he made the same declaration;

- So diving a little more into Samuel to discover his meaning;
- The urgency for Samuel to accept this call that God put on his heart; the Word reveals to us that Samuel slept no more that night.
- The first revelation and the accompanying message had greatly impressed him so much that how could one sleep after this encounter?
- However, this young person, Samuel was also fearful about telling Eli about his calling,
- And the other greatest celebration is that Eli called out to Samuel with an openness to learn what the Lord had said to him.
- And as a side note, that is an area that the church needs to do better in from my perspective;
- In recognizing that these young people are skilled;
- In recognizing that they are resilient;

- In recognizing that they are capable of doing more than often what the Church allows them to do;
- This is another reason why I envision First UMC as being this teaching sacred space; that affirms the voice and call of this younger generation;
- A generation that will no longer tolerate the wreckage that comes from social isolation and discrimination;
- A generation who is not afraid to embrace who they are;
- · Whether they identify as a he, she, they or them;
- This generation church is more than capable of leading the church into better days;
- It is time that the former generations stop bashing the younger generation with claims that they are confused and have lost their way a a result of; but to

take on the role of Eli with these young people and beckon them to "tell us more!"

- Tell us more how the violence in school affects you;
- Tell us more how this pandemic is affecting you;
- **Tell us more** how all of these isms of social injustice is affecting you....
- Young people, we hear you, we see you....tell us more;
- Perhaps in the spirit of inquiry and endorsement is how you and I of the former generations actually learn how to be here;
- By not hindering our youth and young people because it challenges the traditions that you and I have become accustomed to;
- Traditions that have actually fueled the very isms that we are desperately trying to eradicate for once and for all;

- Perhaps how you and I really learn to be here, is by making space for the newer generations to help the church become more adaptive, resilient, courageous and inclusive.
- For there is a lot to be learned through this exchange between Eli and Samuel;
- And I am so grateful for Eli's example to the former generations of today;
- For because Eli embraced Samuel and heard him fully;
- Samuel's way of being here involved becoming the recognized leader of the religious life of the people (v. 20).
- From Dan to Beersheba Israelites came to Samuel at Shiloh.
- Moreover, the word of the Lord through Samuel was spread throughout Israel.

- This church marked an important difference from the times when there were rare occurrences of the Word of the Lord.
- Samuel's willing response to the Lord had released
 Israel from the dearth of divine revelation (vv. 19–21).
- Making it possible for those to really hear the Word of God.
- After all, isn't that what being here is all about?
- Being able to be here so that we can learn how to be in communion and covenant with God?
- Being able to be here so that we can be in communion and covenant with one another?
- In a world where there is so much noise; so many distractions; so much evil; so much hatred; so much senseless violence and more;
- •If you and I cannot hear the voice of God;

- Then we will not know how to make a way in the wilderness;
- If you and I cannot hear God; then we cannot see the provisions that the Spirit of the Lord is making on our behalf;
- •If you and I cannot hear God; then how can we really be here?
- If we continue to dismiss and silence the voice of the newer generations who are anxiously waiting to be able to don on the breastplate of righteousness;
- All they are waiting for is for someone to help them to put it on;
- •Then we will continue to leave ourselves open to spiritual warfare and spiritual death;

- If you and I refuse to hear the voices of these younger generations; as they cry out for peace, mercy and justice for all;
- •Then perhaps the real sobering awakening is that we as the church won't be here.....
- For there is a lot that we can learn from Eli in this chapter;
- But dare I say that there is even more that we can learn from the Samuels of today;
- So tell us more Samuel;
- Tell us more youth;
- Tell us more young adults;
- •Here we are.....Here I am....Tell us more!

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- Leaders that have sacrificed so much; so that all of us can truly pursue the happiness that the Declaration of Independence proclaims that all humans have been given by their creator;
- So that you and I can continue this work until we have satisfied this declaration that I have just shared;
- And so the preaching focus of the earlier sermon gleaned off of young Samuel's acceptance of his call and his response to the call from the Lord was "Here I am."
- What I invited us to do individually is exploring what does being here actually involve from us?

- In this sermon, I want us to focus on how we learn to be here as the church.
- And so the reality for me is that until we do the hard work of exploring what it means to be here as an individual;
- It would be nearly impossible to define then how the church might be here.
- Because the goal of doing this individual work of discernment and inquiry is so that we can then help others by God's grace, strength and wisdom learn to be here;
- So that we can help others embrace who they are and whose they are in God's eyes;
- So that we can help lead others with the primary
 help of the Holy Spirit; into a journey of exploring how
 their time, talents, gifts, service and witness impacts
 our local church communities and the world.
- So you see church, for me this intentional work goes hand in hand;

- And I really invite you to take a look at a later time;
 the Part 1 portion of this message so that you may
 receive a more comprehensive picture;
- But let me just also name and affirm that in many ways our gospel agrees with everything that I have just stated;
- Because in unpacking our gospel this morning;
- At this time Jesus began to recruit disciples, more especially that small band of twelve men who later were to be called apostles.
- Now we do not have the record of the call of each one, but, in the account given us by John, three elements of the call stand out.
- First, there is the drawing power of Christ.
- I am convinced that it was not John the Baptist's introduction as much as something in Jesus which caused Andrew to go from the one to the other.
- You see church there is a magnetism about Christ and the Gospel which draws people to Him;

- A magnetism that invites people to discover who they are and whose they are in Christ Jesus;
- A magnetism that invites people into discovering how their unique spiritual gifts can help face the storms of racial and social injustice and more!
- A magnetism that invites people to discover how they might advance the kingdom of God.
- Second, you and I are witnessing the testimony of dedicated people in this particular gospel.
- John the Baptist brought Andrew, who in turn brought Peter; and then Philip brought Nathanael.
- You see church there is a naturalness, for the one who believes in Him, to testify about Jesus.
- It is proven that normally how one discovers Christ for themselves is because of the natural conversations that prompt us to reach out to others through our own story.
- For it doesn't take a lot of bible knowledge to invite someone into the faith of Jesus Christ;

- My spiritual awakening is that it is perhaps us learning how to be here in all of our spiritual organic gifts that brings others into the fold of Christ.
- Perhaps it is your calming and affirming presence that makes space for another to follow;
- Perhaps it is your vulnerability and willingness to share that makes space for another to follow;
- Either way I trust that my thoughts are not that far off based; if on the contrary negativity and judgment tends to keep people miles away from the church;
- So what I am suggesting is that by you and I learning the art of what it means to be here;
- It is by you and I doing the tough work of embracing our spiritual gifts and intentionally using them in the body of Christ and throughout our communities; through our prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness along with the unique skill sets that each and everyone has;

- This is how we makes spaces for others to be here...
 and I mean REALLY BE HERE.....
- You see church, looking back at our gospel this morning; in a straightforward way Andrew testified,
 We have found him, of whom Moses in the law, and the prophets, wrote, Jesus of Nazareth.
- So in this church, there is the invitation of Christ.
 Prior to Jesus appeal to Philip, Follow me, there is this picture of the seeking Christ who found Philip.
- Had Andrew and Peter told him of Christ? (They were from the same city.)
- Had Jesus learned of Philip and gone in search of him?
- You see church, Not everyone responds to the call to follow Christ as readily as did Andrew and Philip.
- There was Nathanael who was more like Thomas in his skeptical approach to what his friends claimed to be true.

- Philip's answer to this attitude was equal to the occasion: "Come and find out for yourself."
- As a result Nathanael came, and seeing was believing, largely because of Christ's superior knowledge and insight.
- Jesus could say, Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile!, because he himself knew what was in man (2:25)
- And leading into my third point of what is occurring in this gospel; because Nathanael was an exceptional example of a chosen people, one in whom the moral law of Moses had become effective.
- The bottom line church, we are witnessing the positive ripple effect of how one person; Philip did the work of exploration upon himself to learn what it means to be here;
- Thereby making a space for another person to discover how truly valuable and sacred they are to God.

- For verse 48 of our gospel reveals a powerful interaction between Jesus and Nathaniel that I do not want us to miss;
- In fact I implore us not to miss the power of this exchange;
- Because verse 48 states 48 Nathanael asked him (Jesus), "Where did you get to know me?" Jesus answered, "I saw you under the fig tree before Philip called you.
- And I don't know about you, I am struck by the
 positive feeling that energizes my soul and Spirit as I
 recognize in this our gospel someone feeling fully
 seen for perhaps the first time ever in their life;
- Similar to the Woman at the Well and the Woman with the issues of blood; I stopped by to suggest that there is nothing more powerful than a person who finally feels seen.

- In fact as we prepare to celebrate Dr. King's birthday, that is all that his transformational leadership was about—ensuring that everyone is seen;
- His ministry and leadership was all about everyone being allowed to actively participate and contribute to in his moral imagination revealed as cultivating a Beloved community!
- As I reflection on Dr. King's brilliant scholarship of what it means to create a Beloved Community;
- I think back to some of the footage that I saw when the lyrics of "We Shall Overcome" was sung in what would soon become the turning point of the Civil Rights Era;
- -And seeing with my own eyes; Blacks and whites, marching down the Alabama streets side by side together....
- for a brief moment, I believe America caught a glimpse of this "beloved community"

- Another instance where I have seen a glimpse of the beloved community, is when people from all backgrounds came together during the awful 9-11 attack; trying to place the pieces of their lives back together again.
- Another instance of a beloved community that I hope
 will form is after this tragic aftermath of the
 insurrection of the Capitol; I am hoping that a strong
 alliance will be formed that involving a beloved
 community that is genuinely concerned for the
 welfare and equality of a community of all people,
 regardless of race, religion, or political belief
 becomes priority.
- A beloved community where all people can share in the wealth of the earth and all that she produces.
- A Beloved Community where poverty, hunger, homelessness, crime and violence can and will not be tolerated because international standards of human decency will not allow it.

- A beloved community where Racism, bigotry and prejudice is replaced by a redeeming spirit of human family.
- I am envisioning church a Beloved Community where international disputes would be resolved by peaceful conflict-resolution and reconciliation of adversaries, instead of military power.
- A beloved community where Love and trust triumphs over fear and hatred.
- Church I am praying for a beloved community where Peace with justice would prevail over war and military conflict.
- I am working towards a beloved community where we all can embrace that each and every one of us is a child of God and of equal intrinsic worth..
- A community that reflects that I'm no better than you....you're no better than me.....we are equally as valuable and precious in God's eyes......

- This Church is how I believe we can be here and REALLY BE HERE;
- Having consistent messaging by way of teaching, preaching, service, worship that strives to help all people feel seen;
- Helping people to get out of the Egypt wilderness. Of social injustice, marginalization and oppression, one person at time; as we all walk into the land flowing with milk and honey together; with the words of our first lesson Psalm 139 in our hearts;

O Lord, you have searched me and known me.

You know when I sit down and when I rise up; you discern my thoughts from far away.

You search out my path and my lying down, and are acquainted with all my ways.

Even before a word is on my tongue,

O Lord, you know it completely.

You hem me in, behind and before, and lay your hand upon me.

Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is so high that I cannot attain it.

For it was you who formed my inward parts; you knit me together in my mother's womb.
