We are in the month of September and the personal word that I am reflecting on is “focus.” In the midst of the raging storm of Hurricane Ida; the devastating impact of the delta variant; war and violence persisting in Afghanistan and basic resources such as water, being a real concern for states such as California and Las Vegas; it would be an understatement for me to say that it is difficult to focus.

There have been times in my prayer time, I have gone to God in a state of panic. However, the guidance that I have received from the Holy Spirit has informed me, “it is not time to panic, it is time to focus.”

Such a bizarre instruction I know, but nevertheless this is what I have been striving to do....focus. I have found myself focusing on some of the catastrophic events that have occurred throughout the Bible; the flood, famine, war and more. We must focus on what we can do and trust that through this process, we are making progress through Christ who gives us strength. We must focus on how we can do our parts and not put wasted energy on what we do not have the answers to. For I believe that in time more things will be evident.

All of this is not easy to do, but I have been pleasantly surprised at the little gifts that have come from this focus. On a personal note, I feel more confident and assured. My anxiety has decreased. I am able to enjoy meaningful time with my family and friends. I suppose the greatest gift of focus has been living into the scripture; "Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself."

Systemic change in government treatment of the hungry is possible. Annually we write Bread for the World letters to our state and local representatives, pleading the case of the hungry. These letters have changed policy, according to Bread for the World.

Alan Guebert in Sunday's LJS wrote, "...between 60 and 70% of recipients of SNAP (food stamps) are employed." Their income is too small to buy enough healthy food to sustain themselves and their families. Mostly they are working for Walmart, McDonalds, Dollar Tree, and Dollar General, whose profits were huge last year. While we (you and I and the gov'mint) are footing the bill to keep them from being hungry. It just

There are many conversation guides, principles of dialogue, and other covenantal agreements that can help create a safer space for difficult explorations. We pray the following touchstones (or similar) will help guide your mind and heart as you interact with others as well as self-reflect in our own truth and experiences during this transformation time. ### **Circle of Trust Touchstones for Safe and Trustworthy Space**

- ***Give and receive welcome.*** People learn best in hospitable spaces. In this circle we support each other's learning by giving and receiving hospitality.
- ***Be present as fully as possible.*** Be here with your doubts, fears and failings as well as your convictions, joys and successes, and listening as well as speaking.
- ***What is offered in the circle is by invitation, not demand.*** This is not a "share or die" event! Do whatever your soul calls for and know that you do it with our support. Your soul knows your needs better than we do.
- ***Speak your truth in ways that respect other people's truth.*** Our views of reality may differ but speaking one's truth in a circle of trust does not mean interpreting, correcting, or debating what others say. Speak from your center to the center of the circle, using "I" statements, trusting people to do their

own sifting and winnowing.

- **No fixing, saving, advising, or correcting each other.** This is one of the hardest guidelines for those of us who like to “help.” But it is vital to welcoming the soul, to making space for the inner teacher.

- **Learn to respond to others with honest, open questions.** Do not respond with counsel or corrections. Using honest, open questions helps us “hear each other into deeper speech.”

- **When the going gets rough, turn to wonder.** Turn from reaction and judgment to wonder and compassionate inquiry. Ask yourself, “I wonder why they feel/think this way?” or “I wonder what my reaction teaches me about myself?” Set aside judgment to listen to others—and to yourself—more deeply.

- **Attend to your own inner teacher.** We learn from others, of course. But as we explore poems, stories, questions, and silence in a circle of trust, we have a special opportunity to learn from within. So pay close attention to your own reactions and responses, to your most important teacher.

- **Trust and learn from the silence.** Silence is a gift in our noisy world, and a way of knowing in itself. Treat silence as a member of the group. After someone has spoken, take time to reflect without immediately filling the space with words.

- **Observe deep confidentiality.** Safety is built

guests attending. Outside vendors rent a space and share a percentage of their profit, but proceeds from all other areas go directly to mission. Join in the fun! Come!

We will be going forward with the creation of our meditation



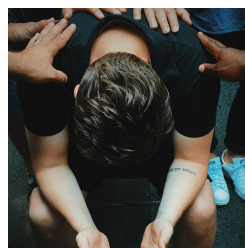

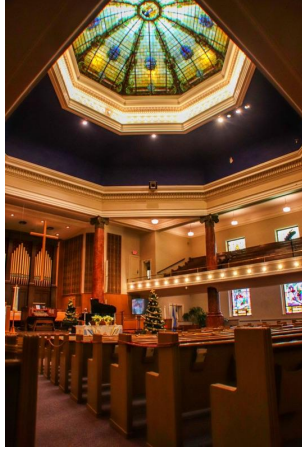
